




Special Needs Planning Dynamics

- Lifetime considerations.
- Identifying income needs & resources.

- Preparing estate planning documents.
- Creating a financial plan.

Ongoing oversight can help avoid any potential problems that might arise in the future as a result from changes in the law or changes in applicable government benefit programs.

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
